India, as one of the first signatories to the Convention on the of Intangible Cultural Protection Legacy, is continually seeking new ways to showcase its vibrant heritage. With the inclusion of Durga Puja in UNESCO's ICH, India has taken an additional step in presenting its intangible but incomparable culture to the entire world. Durga Puja gathers the entire city of Kolkata together to dress up in colourful festive apparel. The ten-day celebration is one of the most anticipated events in West Bengal as well as in many other places all over the world.



Tapati Guha Thakurta, a well-known art historian, and her colleagues participated in the production of the dossier, which was handed to UNESCO by the Union Cultural Minister. It was submitted in March 2019 and was eventually placed on "UNESCO's Representative List of Humanity's Intangible Cultural Heritage" in December 2021. "I can't take credit for the work all by myself. It's a joint effort by our team and all stakeholders associated with Puja," she stated.

Bhoot Chaturdarshi

As a child, how enthralled were you by Halloween? Your interest may have been piqued by movies like *Goosebumps*, *Anabelle* or even the scary cosplays that you see on the television. Did you ever hope to be a part of the groups of American children who go "trick-or-treating" on Halloween and collect chocolates and candies from the neighbourhood? Well, your dreams might just come true when you get to know about the "Indian Halloween," better known as "Bhoot Chaturdashi."

On the day before Kali Puja, the people in West Bengal celebrate "Bhoot Chaturdashi". According to the famous folklores of Bengal, on this day, forefathers from the 14 previous generations transcend the boundaries between heaven and earth to come and visit their near and dear ones. Two significant rituals followed on this day are consumption of 14 varieties of leafy greens ["Choddo Shaak"] and lighting 14 "diyas"/candles ["Choddo Pradeep"] in the evening. While having the "Choddo Shaak" is to ensure a nutritious diet so that the unsatiated souls do not get to "harm the living," lighting of the "Choddo Pradeep" is believed to ward off evil spirits and guide our deceased family members home.



The historical significance of "Bhoot Chaturdashi" is very similar to that of Halloween since both these festivals honour the deceased ancestors of a family.







A Clean Diwali

On October 26th, the *Indian Express* reported that Delhi's post-Diwali air quality was the cleanest it had been since 2015. In fact, it was better than the two pandemic years, 2020 and 2021, combined. In 2020, the Air Quality Index (AQI) in Delhi was recorded in the "severe" category (401 - 500) and in 2021, it remained as high as 462. The reports claim that this year Delhi's AQI was 312 on Diwali and 303 the following day (301 - 401 is 'very poor' category).

According to experts, people disregarded the law and burst firecrackers on Diwali night, which caused the primary pollutant levels to climb up to 10 - 17 times the permissible level in various parts of the city. However, the air quality steadily improved due to favourable meteorological conditions.




This graph shows the air quality on Diwali (red) and before Diwali (black)

Gufran Beig, the creator and project director of SAFAR, claimed that the rapid blows of the winds during Diwali prevented the accumulation of pollutants. In fact, the visibility during the day was between 3,000 and 4,000 metres, which is very unusual in Delhi on the occasion of Diwali.

Additionally, the fact that Diwali came early this year also prevented the air from cooling sufficiently to trap pollutants at the lower atmospheric levels. On Tuesday, 25th October 2022, the wind picked up speed around two in the morning. Hence, the pollutants that would often have accumulated in the early morning hours got dispersed as the wind speed increased. According to Beig, the AQI peaked at midnight, but then improved and levelled off at 303 the next morning.

Science A Shocking New Discovery - Amorphous Ice!

Did you know about the brand-new discovery of amorphous ice?

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Well, researchers at UCL and the University of Cambridge have discovered a unique kind of ice that is more comparable to liquid water than any other previously known ice. It has the potential to redefine our knowledge of water and its innumerable abnormalities that have long perplexed scientists. To illustrate, water loses density as it freezes and reaches its maximum density at 4°C (hence, ice floats). Additionally, contrary to the general rule for most other things, compressing liquid water becomes simpler the more you squeeze it. However, scientists have discovered that when amorphous ice was heated and crushed, it recrystallized with a strikingly high energy release. This newly found ice is amorphous, which means that its molecules are not uniformly ordered as they are in ordinary, crystalline ice. Amorphous ice is the most typical kind of ice found in space and is extremely scarce on Earth, as in the freezing environment of space, ice lacks the thermal energy to crystallize.

For the study, which was published in the journal *Science*, the research team used a method known as "ball milling," vigorously spinning ordinary ice and steel balls in a jar frozen to -200 °C. They determined that the technique created a distinct, amorphous sort of ice, unlike all other known ices! These particles weren't tiny pieces of traditional ice but rather had the same density as liquid water and a consistency close to that of solid water. The new ice was given the term "medium-density amorphous ice" (MDA).

Now, did you know that scientists postulated that MDA, which resembles a fine white powder, may exist inside the ice moons of the outer solar system because tidal forces from gas giants like Jupiter and Saturn may exert equivalent shear stresses on ordinary ice as those induced by ball milling? A kilometre-thick layer of ice covers moons like Ganymede, and the researchers found that MDA created a significant amount of heat when it was heated and recrystallized, indicating that it may be responsible for tectonic movements and "icequakes" in that layer. Water may be a very active geophysical element that drives tectonic motions on the ice moons of the solar system! Similar to how window glass is the solid form of liquid silicon dioxide, MDA may be the actual glassy state of liquid water. Another theory states that MDA is severely sheared crystalline rather than glassy. Understanding the exact atomic structure of MDA is crucial because it provides answers to numerous issues about the nature of liquid water that have been raised by its discovery. So what more do you want to know about this brand new kind of ice? Do you think this discovery is going to be a game-changer?

In a style that was quite recognizable, much like his career, the renowned athlete Roger Federer announced his retirement after 24 years. With 1251 Tour-level matches, 20 Grand Slam titles, 103 ATP single titles, and 310 weeks at the top of the rankings, he had one of the most successful careers ever.

He has always been empathetic on court and he is a very kind-hearted person.

His professional life has set the bar in terms of what it means to pursue greatness and to lead with moral integrity.

Roger Federer was unique in his non-confrontational style. However, he also never shied away from addressing the crucial tennis issues of the day. Throughout their prime, he became the

closest of friends with his fiercest adversary, Rafael Nadal, which is a remarkable development in an individual sport that breeds intense and often harsh competition. He has been injured multiple times and has excelled through each one. Federer underwent three procedures in 18 months after undergoing surgery on his left knee in 2016. The first two were in early 2020, and the most recent injury occurred after Wimbledon 2021 when he lost in the quarter finals against Hubert Hurkacz. Federer did not give up despite all of this. At the Laver Cup, he competed in his final match alongside Rafael Nadal. His two coaches, Severin Luthi and Ivan Ljubicic were in attendance at The O2 to support them in their final effort.

Everyone who has had the chance to observe him over the years has enjoyed seeing him play tennis and taking in all of the amazing experiences he has had, both on and off the court. Getting to watch one match with Roger Federer was an honor for the people. Fans of Roger Federer, including his wife Mirka, their children, and all of his loved ones, have a lot to look forward to. He will experience fantastic things. Everyone will miss his historic matches as well as his presence on the court.



The first ODI cricket match of 2023, between India and Sri Lanka, began on January 10, 2023. It was held at Guwahati's Barsapara Cricket Stadium. India ended up winning the match, making the score 1-0. The "Man of the Match" award was given to Virat Kohli, who scored a grand total of 113 runs off 87 deliveries. This was his 45th ODI against Sri Lanka and his ninth century against them. With this, Kolhi broke Sachin Tendulkar's record of eight centuries against Sri Lanka. This century was also Virat Kolhi's 20th ODI century on home soil, which he was able to complete in just 99 innings overall, whereas Sachin took 160 innings. Internationally, this was his 73rd ODI

India

IND won by 67 runs ODI 1 of 3 (IND leads 1-0) century, second in line after Sachin Tendulkar's 100 centuries.


India vs Srilanka ODI match, 10th January 2023, Indía vs Srilanka score

Currently, the record is held by Sachin, who has scored 49 ODI centuries, while Virat stands close behind with 45 total centuries in this series. Virat Kolhi holds the title of "Century King" as he continues to break many more world records.


GHOST BUSTERS




Film review: This film touches the heart. The personality of the main character takes everyone on a whirlwind journey. It is perfect for explaining the ideas of culture and family.



Recipe

Apple crumble custard

Ingredients required: Crunchy base Biscuit: 250 grams Butter: 80 grams Apple coating Apples: 600 grams Cinnamon: according to your taste preference Castor sugar: according to your taste preference Custard layer Milk: 2 litres Cornflour: 3 tablespoons Vanilla extract: 2 teaspoons Castor sugar: 1/3 cup



Process of preparation:

~The crunchy base

Grind the biscuits and butter together and bake for approximately ten minutes to form a base for the custard.

~The apple layer

Saute some freshly chopped apples onto a low flame with water until it turns into a golden hue. Add as much water as required for absorption. Then put in some sugar and cinnamon and gently mix. Make sure that the apples don't lose their shape and then cool the apples before pouring the custard layer.

The custard~

Thicken the milk until it gets creamy. Add cornstarch (cornflour), castor sugar and vanilla extract to the custard {naturally, two litres of milk will be enough to turn into a litre after it gets creamy}

Arrangement:

Align a springform pan with parchment paper and place the biscuit layer so that it can be baked.

After cooling it, add half of the apple layer and then add the custard layer.

Refrigerate it for 1-2 hours.

After it turns into a semi solid, add the remaining apple layer and freeze overnight.
